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exhilarating stewart has achieved a near impossibility creating a page turner about jousting metaphysical ideas casting thinkers as warriors liesl schillinger new york times book review once upon a time philosophy was a dangerous business and for no one more so than for baruch spinoza the seventeenth century philosopher vilified by theologians and political authorities everywhere as the atheist jew as his inflammatory manuscripts circulated underground spinoza lived a humble existence in the hague grinding optical lenses to make ends meet meanwhile in the glittering salons of paris gottfried wilhelm leibniz was climbing the ladder of courtly success in between trips to the opera and groundbreaking work in mathematics philosophy and jurisprudence he took every opportunity to denounce spinoza relishing his self appointed role as god s attorney in this exquisitely written philosophical romance of attraction and repulsion greed and virtue religion and heresy matthew stewart gives narrative form to an epic contest of ideas that shook the seventeenth century and continues today

when it appeared in 1670 baruch spinoza s theological political treatise was denounced as the most dangerous book ever published religious and secular authorities saw it as a threat to faith social and political harmony and everyday morality and its author was almost universally regarded as a religious subversive and political radical who sought to spread atheism throughout europe steven nadler tells the story of this book its radical claims and their background in the philosophical religious and political tensions of the dutch golden age as well as the vitriolic reaction these ideas inspired a vivid story of incendiary ideas and vicious backlash a book forged in hell will interest anyone who is curious about the origin of some of our most cherished modern beliefs jacket p 2

part of the jewish encounter series in 1656 amsterdam s jewish community excommunicated baruch spinoza and at the age of twenty three he became the most famous heretic in judaism he was already germinating a secularist challenge to religion that would be as radical as it was original he went on to produce one of the most ambitious systems in the history of western philosophy so ahead of its time that

scientists today from string theorists to neurobiologists count themselves among spinoza's progeny in betraying spinoza rebecca goldstein sets out to rediscover the flesh and blood man often hidden beneath the veneer of rigorous rationality and to crack the mystery of the breach between the philosopher and his jewish past goldstein argues that the trauma of the inquisition's persecution of its forced jewish converts plays itself out in spinoza's philosophy the excommunicated spinoza no less than his excommunicators was responding to europe's first experiment with racial anti-semitism here is a spinoza both hauntingly emblematic and deeply human both heretic and hero a surprisingly contemporary figure ripe for our own uncertain age from the hardcover edition

how would plato have responded if his student aristotle had ever challenged his idea that our senses perceive nothing more than the shadows cast upon a wall by a true world of perfect ideals what would charles darwin have said to karl marx about his claim that dialectical materialism is a scientific theory of evolution how would jean paul sartre have reacted to simone de beauvoir's claim that the marquis de sade was a philosopher worthy of serious attention this light hearted book proposes answers to such questions by imagining dialogues between thirty three pairs of philosophical sages who were alive at the same time sometime famous sages get a much rougher handling than usual as when adam smith beards immanuel kant in his konigsberg den sometimes neglected or

maligned sages get a chance to say what they really believed as when epicurus explains that he wasn't epicurean sometimes the dialogues are about the origins of modern concepts as when blaise pascal and pierre de fermat discuss their invention of probability or when john nash and john von neumann discuss the creation of game theory even in these scientific cases the intention is that the protagonists come across as fallible human beings like the rest of us rather than the intellectual paragons of philosophical textbooks

pioneering biblical critic theorist of democracy and legendary conflator of god and nature jewish philosopher baruch spinoza 1632 1677 was excommunicated by the sephardic jews of amsterdam in 1656 for his horrible heresies and monstrous deeds yet over the past three centuries spinoza's rupture with traditional jewish beliefs and practices has elevated him to a prominent place in genealogies of jewish modernity the first modern jew provides a riveting look at how spinoza went from being one of judaism's most notorious outcasts to one of its most celebrated if still highly controversial cultural icons and a powerful and protean symbol of the first modern secular jew ranging from amsterdam to palestine and back again to europe the book chronicles spinoza's posthumous odyssey from marginalized heretic to hero the exemplar of a whole host of jewish identities including cosmopolitan nationalist reformist and rejectionist daniel schwartz shows that in fashioning spinoza into the first modern jew generations of jewish intellectuals german liberals east european maskilim secular zionists and yiddishists have projected their own dilemmas of identity onto him reshaping the amsterdam thinker in their own image the many afterlives of spinoza are a kind of looking glass into the struggles of jewish writers over where to draw the boundaries of jewishness and whether a secular jewish identity is indeed possible cumulatively these afterlives offer a kaleidoscopic view of modern jewish culture and a vivid history of an obsession with spinoza that continues to this day

contemporary philosophers frequently assume that kant never seriously engaged with spinoza or spinozism certainly not before the break of der pantheismusstreit or within the critique of pure reason offering an alternative reading of key pre-critical texts and to some of the critique's most central chapters omri boehm challenges this common assumption he argues that kant not only is committed to spinozism in early essays such as the one possible basis and new elucidation but also takes up spinozist metaphysics as transcendental realism's most consistent form in the critique of pure reason the success or failure of kant's critical projects must be evaluated in this light boehm here examines the antinomies alongside spinoza's substance monism and his theory of freedom similarly he analyzes the refutation of the ontological argument in parallel with spinoza's *causa sui* more generally boehm places the critique of pure reason's separation of thought from being and is from ought in dialogue with the ethics collapse of being is and ought into thought

this book sheds new light on those who inherit spinoza s thought and its consequences materially rather than metaphysically

a marvelous rediscovery the compelling story of the strange and noble life and dream of nineteenth century utopian social revolutionary and self taught engineer narcis monturiol who invented the world s first fully operational steam powered submarine not as a weapon of war but as a means of saving human life and spreading democracy matthew stewart tells the story of monturiol from his childhood to his years living the dangerous life of a revolutionary we see him at the bloody barricades and fleeing one step ahead of the barcelona police to the remote coastline of northern catalonia on that shore watching teams of divers risk their lives gathering coral from the water s depths for use in the making of jewels candelabras and crimson pigment he finds the true purpose of his life he saves a man presumed dead from drowning and conceives of a craft that will protect the divers who harvest coral a safe hermetically sealed underwater vessel that will make the ocean s bounty available to the common man stewart writes about the building of monturiol s submarine how without scientific education he was a lawyer by training monturiol read books on physics chemistry and biology how he launched a hand powered prototype submarine capable of reaching depths of sixty feet how his efforts to gain government support for building a larger submarine were thwarted his invention was dismissed by one official as having no useful applications we see monturiol unwilling to give up on his dream turn to the artists poets and musicians of barcelona to help him mobilize the public to fund his project and how he launched his second much larger vessel five years later the most advanced submarine of its day at more than fifty feet long it displaced seventy two tons and navigated reliably at depths of up to one hundred feet with a unique system for eliminating carbon dioxide replenishing oxygen in the interior cabin and enabling its crew to remain underwater indefinitely it had a steam engine for propulsion a chemical furnace to heat the engine as it generated oxygen for the crew external lights portholes and pincers for harvesting coral and other objects from the deep it was the first true submarine the world would not see its equal for another twenty years and we watch as monturiol s revolutionary friends making use of his utopian ideals and notions of urban planning a term he originated forge a new culture for catalonia and its capital city and create the radical design that resulted in an entirely new barcelona

the ethics is one of the undisputed masterworks of early modern philosophy in this single volume spinoza offers the reader an unorthodox account of god a novel version of the

mind body relation a systematic theory of the emotions and a detailed prescription for human virtue and blessedness too controversial to be published during his lifetime it was surreptitiously printed by spinoza s friends after his death nowadays the ethics is studied in university classes as an exemplary work of early modern rationalism in spinoza s ethics a reader s guide j thomas cook explains the philosophical background against which the book was written and the key themes inherent in the text the book then guides the reader to a clear understanding of the text as a whole before exploring the reception and influence of this classic philosophical work this is the ideal companion to study of this most influential and challenging of texts

this study chronicles spinoza s german jewish popularity during the years of the weimar republic 1918 1933 explaining it from the political moral and intellectual paradoxes with which weimar germany confronted its jews

ethics demonstrated in geometrical order latin *ethica ordine geometrico demonstrata* usually known as the ethics is a philosophical treatise written by benedict de spinoza it was written between 1664 and 1665 and was first published in 1677 the book is perhaps the most ambitious attempt to apply the method of euclid in philosophy spinoza puts forward a small number of definitions and axioms from which he attempts to derive hundreds of propositions and corollaries such as when the mind imagines its own lack of power it is saddened by it a free man thinks of nothing less than of death and the human mind cannot be absolutely destroyed with the body but something of it remains which is eternal

a deleuzian reading of whitehead and a whiteheadian reading of deleuze open the possibility of a critical aesthetics of contemporary culture in without criteria steven shaviro proposes and explores a philosophical fantasy imagine a world in which alfred north whitehead takes the place of martin heidegger what if whitehead instead of heidegger had set the agenda for postmodern thought heidegger asks why is there something rather than nothing whitehead asks how is it that there is always something new in a world where everything from popular music to dna is being sampled and recombined argues shaviro whitehead s question is the truly urgent one without criteria is shaviro s experiment in rethinking postmodern theory especially the theory of aesthetics from a point of view that hearkens back to whitehead rather than heidegger in working through the ideas of whitehead and deleuze shaviro also appeals to kant arguing that certain aspects of kant s thought pave the way for the philosophical constructivism embraced by both whitehead and deleuze kant whitehead and deleuze are not commonly grouped together but the juxtaposition of them in without criteria helps to shed light on a variety of issues that are of concern to contemporary art and media practices

the story of the trial of visionary philosopher giordano bruno a nice overview of the conflict between religion and philosophy in the renaissance publishers weekly giordano bruno challenged everything in his pursuit of an all embracing system of thought this not

only brought him patronage from powerful figures of the day but also put him in direct conflict with the catholic church arrested by the inquisition and tried as a heretic bruno was imprisoned tortured and after eight years burned at the stake in 1600 the vatican regrets the burning yet refuses to clear him of heresy but bruno s philosophy spread galileo isaac newton christiaan huygens and gottfried leibniz all built upon his ideas his thought experiments predate the work of such twentieth century luminaries as karl popper his religious thinking inspired such radicals as baruch spinoza and his work on the art of memory had a profound effect on william shakespeare chronicling a genius whose musings helped bring about the modern world michael white pieces together the final years the capture trial and the threat the catholic church felt that made bruno a martyr of free thought white s book is exemplary for its discussions of the period s intellectual beliefs and social structure and for its vivid detail and illuminating look at bruno s trial and subsequent death library journal riveting birmingham post

now regarded as the bane of many college students existence calculus was one of the most important mathematical innovations of the seventeenth century but a dispute over its discovery sewed the seeds of discontent between two of the greatest scientific giants

of all time sir isaac newton and gottfried wilhelm leibniz today newton and leibniz are generally considered the twin independent inventors of calculus and they are both credited with giving mathematics its greatest push forward since the time of the greeks had they known each other under different circumstances they might have been friends but in their own lifetimes the joint glory of calculus was not enough for either and each declared war against the other openly and in secret this long and bitter dispute has been swept under the carpet by historians perhaps because it reveals newton and leibniz in their worst light but the calculus wars tells the full story in narrative form for the first time this vibrant and gripping scientific potboiler ultimately exposes how these twin mathematical giants were brilliant proud at times mad and in the end completely human

how a famous painting opens a window into the life times and philosophy of rené descartes in the louvre museum hangs a portrait that is considered the iconic image of rené descartes the great seventeenth century french philosopher and the painter of the work the dutch master frans Hals or so it was long believed until the work was downgraded to a copy of an original but where is the authentic version and who painted it is the man in the painting and in its original really descartes a unique combination of philosophy biography and art history the philosopher the priest and the painter investigates the remarkable individuals and circumstances behind a small portrait through this image and the intersecting lives of a brilliant philosopher a catholic priest and a gifted painter steven nadler opens a fascinating portal into descartes s life and times skillfully presenting an accessible introduction to descartes s philosophical and scientific ideas and an illuminating tour of the volatile political and religious environment of the dutch golden age as nadler shows descartes s innovative ideas about the world about human nature and knowledge and about philosophy itself stirred great controversy philosophical and theological critics vigorously opposed his views and civil and ecclesiastic authorities condemned his writings nevertheless descartes s thought came to dominate the philosophical world of the period and can rightly be called the philosophy of the seventeenth century shedding light on a well known image the philosopher the priest and the painter offers an engaging exploration of a celebrated philosopher s world and work

a biography of the boldest and most unsettling of the early modern philosophers spinoza which examines the man s life relationships writings and career while also forcing us to rethink how we previously understood spinoza s reception in his own time and in the years following his death the boldest and most unsettling of the major early modern philosophers spinoza had a much greater if often concealed impact on the international intellectual scene and on the early enlightenment than philosophers historians and political theorists have conventionally tended to recognize europe wide efforts to prevent the reading public and university students learning about spinoza the man and his work in the years immediately after his death in 1677 dominated much of his early reception owing to the revolutionary implications of his thought for philosophy religion practical



ethics and lifestyle bible criticism and political theory nevertheless contrary to what has sometimes been maintained his general impact was immediate very widespread and profound one of the main objectives of the book is to show how early and how deeply leibniz bayle arnauld henry more anne conway richard baxter robert boyle henry oldenburg pierre daniel huet richard simon and nicholas steno among many others were affected by and led to wrestle with his principal ideas there have been surprisingly few biographies of spinoza given his fundamental importance in intellectual history and history of philosophy bible criticism and political thought jonathan i israel has written a biography which provides more detail and context about spinoza s life family writings circle of friends highly unusual career and networking and early reception than its predecessors weaving the circumstances of his life and thought into a detailed biography has also led to several notable instances of nuancing or revising our notions of how to interpret certain of his assertions and philosophical claims and how to understand the complex international reaction to his work during his life time and in the years immediately following his death

rationalism platonism and god comprises three main papers on descartes spinoza and leibniz with extensive responses it provides a significant contribution to the exploration of the common ground of the great early modern rationalist theories and an examination of the ways in which the mainstream platonic tradition permeates these theories john cottingham identifies characteristically platonic themes in descartes s cosmology and metaphysics finding them associated with two distinct even opposed attitudes to nature and the human condition one ancient and contemplative the other modern and controlling he finds the same tension in descartes s moral theory and believes that it remains unresolved in present day ethics was spinoza a neoplatonist theist critical cartesian or naturalistic materialist michael ayers argues that he was all of these analysis of his system reveals how spinoza employed neoplatonist monism against descartes s platonist pluralism yet the terminology like the physics is cartesian and within this platonic cartesian shell spinoza developed a rigorously naturalistic metaphysics and even ayers claims an effectually empiricist epistemology robert merrihew adams focuses on the rationalists arguments for the platonist anti empiricist principle of the priority of the perfect i e the principle that finite attributes are to be understood through corresponding perfections of god rather than the reverse he finds the given arguments unsatisfactory but stimulating and offers a development of one of leibniz s for consideration these papers receive informed and constructive criticism and development at the hands of respectively douglas hedley sarah hutton and maria rosa antognazza

spinoza is a key figure in modern philosophy ethics is his most studied and well known work being both up to date and clear this guidebook is designed to lead the reader through this complex seminal text spinoza s ethics introduces and assess spinoza a life and its connection with his thought the text of the ethics spinoza s continuing relevance to contemporary philosophy

giordano bruno 1548 1600 was a mystic philosopher and scientist whose ideas were decades ahead of their time a proponent of a unificatory vision of science he was both a champion of the occult as newton would be after him and a torch bearer for the sort of holistic dreams that leonardo had cherished before him as such he is perfect material for the third in michael white s loose trilogy of science biographies after newton the last sorcerer and leonardo the first scientist we have bruno science s first martyr

this book presents new insights into leibniz s research on planetary theory and his system of pre established harmony although some aspects of this theory have been explored in the literature others are less well known in particular the book offers new contributions on the connection between the planetary theory and the theory of gravitation it also provides an in depth discussion of kepler s influence on leibniz s planetary theory and more generally on leibniz s concept of pre established harmony three initial chapters presenting the mathematical and physical details of leibniz s works provide a frame of reference the book then goes on to discuss research on leibniz s conception of gravity and the connection between leibniz and kepler

learn how to think well avoid biases and fallacies and understand what philosophy is really about this book covers all the main branches of philosophy epistemology metaphysics ethics explains the basics of the philosophy of science famous thought experiments and more the book was written as part of a project to create youtube lectures for the course and include links to those videos as well as links to other videos websites and articles not related to the project

in the birth of energy cara new daggett traces the genealogy of contemporary notions of energy back to the nineteenth century science of thermodynamics to challenge the underlying logic that informs today s uses of energy these early resource based concepts of power first emerged during the industrial revolution and were tightly bound to western capitalist domination and the politics of industrialized work as daggett shows thermodynamics was deployed as an imperial science to govern fossil fuel use labor and colonial expansion in part through a hierarchical ordering of humans and nonhumans by systematically excavating the historical connection between energy and work daggett argues that only by transforming the politics of work most notably the veneration of waged work will we be able to confront the anthropocene s energy problem substituting one source of energy for another will not ensure a habitable planet rather the concepts of energy and work themselves must be decoupled

when you have been wandering the cosmos from one end of eternity to another for nearly a thousand years what s your philosophy of life the universe and everything doctor who is 50 years old in 2013 through its long life on television and beyond it has inspired much debate due to the richness and complexity of the metaphysical and moral issues that it poses this is the first in depth philosophical investigation of doctor who in popular culture from 1963 s an unearthly child through the latest series it considers continuity and change in the pictures that the programme paints of the nature of truth and knowledge science and religion space and time good and evil including the uncanny the problem of evil the doctor s complex ethical motivations questions of persisting personal identity in the time lord processes of regeneration the nature of time travel through wibbly wobbly timey wimey stuff how quantum theory affects our understanding of time and the nature of the mysterious and irrational in the doctor s universe

and its sequel challenge bertrand russell s classic as the definitive history of western philosophy western philosophy is now two and a half millennia old but much of it came in just two staccato bursts each lasting only about 150 years in his landmark survey of western philosophy from the greeks to the renaissance the dream of reason anthony gottlieb documented the first burst which came in the athens of socrates plato and aristotle now in his sequel the dream of enlightenment gottlieb expertly navigates a second great explosion of thought taking us to northern europe in the wake of its wars of religion and the rise of galilean science in a relatively short period from the early 1640s to the eve of the french revolution descartes hobbes spinoza locke leibniz and hume all made their mark the dream of enlightenment tells their story and that of the birth of modern philosophy as gottlieb explains all these men were amateurs none had much to do with any university they tried to fathom the implications of the new science and of religious upheaval which led them to question traditional teachings and attitudes what does the advance of science entail for our understanding of ourselves and for our ideas of god how should a government deal with religious diversity and what actually is government for such questions remain our questions which is why descartes hobbes and the others are still pondered today yet it is because we still want to hear them that we can easily get these philosophers wrong it is tempting to think they speak our language and live in our world but to understand them properly we must step back into their shoes gottlieb puts readers in the minds of these frequently misinterpreted figures elucidating the history of their times and the development of scientific ideas while engagingly explaining their arguments and assessing their legacy in lively prose with chapters focusing on descartes hobbes spinoza locke pierre bayle leibniz hume rousseau and voltaire and many walk on parts the dream of enlightenment creates a sweeping account of what the enlightenment amounted to and why we are still in its debt

one of the most influential philosophers of the twentieth century ludwig wittgenstein and the roots of his monumental tractatus are explored in this imaginative work oxaal picks up on themes developed in an earlier work of his on jews anti semitism and culture in vienna adding to it special issues concerning wittgenstein s experiences in norway in 1913 14 where he worked on ideas that were completed during the war oxaal situates the great philosopher in time place and attitude showing how his personal background came to bear on the writing of the tractatus wittgenstein has often been criticized for traces of solipsism and even mysticism and oxaal also examines these issues in a volume that integrates ethnography nationality and cultural studies oxaal sheds new light on the theme of wittgenstein s jewishness and develops a new appreciation of the wittgenstein family and wittgenstein s better known years in vienna the author is unsparing in his observations about racism and pessimism in berlin and great britain during the period in which wittgenstein worked and studied at cambridge the writing of the tractatus spanned the first world war in the period immediately after its completion wittgenstein found himself in the hague where he was in discussions and disputes with bertrand russell oxaal covers these problems sensitively and with an appreciation of ambiguities in the life of a

great philosopher and the confusions caused by a post war change in fortunes personal and familial this work of an eminent social scientist and historian may not be the final statement on wittgenstein but it most certainly must be considered in any serious assessments of an iconic figure of the twentieth century

g w leibniz s discourse on metaphysics is viewed by many scholars as a milestone of his mature thought his first attempt to systematize various stances a lengthier theological work examination of the christian religion written a few months after receives less press while leibniz s intent for writing the theological piece may be left for speculation leibniz on god and man in 1686 demonstrates that there is clear overlap between these two texts leibniz borrows from the metaphysics and physics of discourse in his theology and he writes that his metaphysical tract addresses questions on grace god s concurrence with creatures the nature of miracles the cause of sin and the origin of evil the immortality of the soul ideas etc despite challenges for drawing them close ryan phillip quandt argues that these texts converge in the moral quality of god and man that leibniz took as the cornerstone of his system in 1686 discourse coheres in a moral and scientific vision while examination centers on moral commitments love of god is their shared ideal
